





























#### **Brenscombe**

# A word from Chris Cassidy — our new VP

# Online safety - from Annabel - Student Welfare.

The internet is an incredibly useful learning tool but as we all know there is inappropriate material available online, therefore, as a school we have put measures in place to protect students from accessing and being exposed to such content.

The Centre School is equipped with Sophos filtering software which includes a firewall that monitors and filters incoming and outgoing network traffic. Sophos' main purpose is to allow non-threatening digital traffic in and to keep potentially dangerous digital traffic out.



The Centre School also uses NetSupport DNA monitoring software which monitors the school network and identifies when a user triggers terminology that could indicate potential harmful or risky behaviours. Should this arise, staff will deal with it appropriately; parents/carers will be informed.

Furthermore, as part of a whole school approach to personal development, of which e-safety is part of, pupils have PHSE lessons that help them to identify and manage the risks they may be exposed to via the internet, social media or their daily use of mobile communications. Staff also undertake regular safeguarding training which involves online safety so they can spot concerns and deal with them effectively.



## Afloat in a life boat!









In October, a small group of students had a fantastic and very different experience! We headed to Wells-next-the-Sea on the North Norfolk coast for chips and a bit of crabbing, we made our way down the quayside to find a very special vessel.

**Lucy Lavers** is a wooden lifeboat, built for the RNLI in 1939, and she had a long and successful career as a lifeboat around the East Anglian coast. However, her most famous exploit came in May 1940, when she was one of **Dunkirk "Little Ships"**. She spent several days rescuing hundreds of stranded British soldiers from Dunkirk beach in France, ahead of the approaching German forces.

Our trip was 90 minutes around Wells Harbour, and we saw seals and lots of different types of birds. We learned lots about the lifeboats of Wells (our guide was a serving lifeboatman) and found out more about Lucy Lavers' time at Dunkirk. The weather was amazing - warm and calm - and everyone in the group recognised how therapeutic it was being out on the water in the sun. Excellent for good mental health. An experience to remember!
